Venerable Pierre Toussaint was born a slave in Haiti and brought to New York as an apprentice under a popular hairstylist in the city. He became the most sought-after hairdresser of high society women. Upon the death of his master, he gained his freedom and succeeded as one of the country's first black entrepreneurs. He supported the Church and the poor. He founded one of New York's <u>first orphanages</u> and raised money for the city's <u>first cathedral</u>. <u>Vulnerable Pierre Toussaint (1776-1853)</u>

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER AND AWARENESS AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING | The Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace and the International Union of Superiors General has designated February 8 as an annual day of prayer and awareness against human trafficking. On this day, Catholics all over the world are encouraged to host or attend prayer services to create greater awareness about this phenomenon. February 8 is the feast day of St. Josephine Bakhita, who was kidnapped as a child and sold into slavery in Sudan and Italy. Once Josephine was freed, she became a Canossian nun and dedicated her life to sharing her testament of deliverance from slavery and comforting the poor and suffering. She was declared a Saint in 2000.

Servant of God Mother Mary Lange was a native of the Caribbean and believed to be Cuban born of Haitian descent. She was the foundress and first Superior General of the Oblate Sisters of Providence (1829-1832), the first religious congregation of African American women in the history of the Catholic Church. On July 2, 1829, Elizabeth and three other women professed their vows and became the Oblate Sisters of Providence with the goal of educating and evangelizing African Americans. LAUDATE DEUM PLEDGE | *Laudate Deum* is the Apostolic Exhortation of Pope Francis, published in 2023, that calls "all people of good will" to take action on the climate crisis and "move beyond the mentality of appearing to be concerned but not having the courage needed to produce substantial changes." (LD 56) He particularly calls on us in the United States to make personal changes to our consumerist lifestyles, reduce our fossil fuel use, and to also advocate for systemic actions to address the climate crisis.

The Catholic Climate Covenant invites you to take a <u>pledge</u> of action to respond directly to Pope Francis' call for change (personal, within the Church, and wider systemic change). Venerable Augustus Tolton was the first U.S. Roman Catholic priest publicly known to be black when he was ordained in 1886. A former slave who was baptized and reared Catholic, Tolton formally studied in Rome. He was ordained in Rome on Easter Sunday at the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran. Tolton's success at ministering to black Catholics quickly earned him national attention within the Catholic hierarchy. Vulnerable Fr. Augustus Tolton (1854-1897)

40 DAYS FOR LIFE CONSTANT VIGIL Feb. 14-March 24, 7:00 am-7:00 pm | **40 Days for Life Prayer-Reflection** Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." -Luke 2:13-14

The visible, public centerpiece of 40 Days for Life is a focused, 40-day, non-stop, round-the-clock prayer vigil outside a single Planned Parenthood center or other abortion facility in the community. It is a peaceful and educational presence. Those who are called to stand witness during this 24-hour-a-day presence send a powerful message to the community about the tragic reality of abortion.
